Build your vocabulary with flash cards. Many verbal reasoning tests use high-level vocabulary words in the questions. If you don't understand the words, you won't stand a chance of passing the test. Write a word on one side of an index

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card with the definition on the other. Choose 10 at a time, and read the word and try to define it in your own words.
